Communication From

Throughout the Grades



<u>Grade 5</u>

Language Arts - We are focusing on creating great sentences to use as the basis for all of our writing this year. This will culminate in a narrative writing project titled, "All About Me". The focus of our read-aloud novel "Mick Harte was Here" by Barbara Park will be an introduction to story elements and discussions around the themes of safety and loss. Word work will be a study of homophones and their application in our writing. Students are expected to read 2 hours per week outside of school time.

Math:

A - We have been focusing on Multiplication with an emphasis on memorizing up to 10×10 so that students can quickly recall those math facts as we begin to learn double digit multiplication.

B, C and D - We are starting the year with Numeration focusing on place value of whole and decimal numbers. Students are encouraged to practice their times tables at home!

Science:

A, B, and C - The students are working on the Classroom Chemistry Unit. We have learned about properties of matter, and the three states of matter.

D - The students are working on the Weather Unit. We are learning about the different components of weather and how it affects our lives.

Social Studies: We are focusing on an introduction to Canada and what makes it such a wonderful country! In addition, we are working on developing mapping skills by understanding political maps and then will understand how legend, scale and grid systems apply to our world and more specifically Canada.

Reminders:

This year, the Walk a thon is on Friday, October 5, 2018. Please make sure your child is dressed appropriately for the weather, and wearing proper footwear. New shoes are NOT a good idea. Remember to get in your sponsor money by Friday, October 12, in order to be eligible for prizes.

Reminder that there will be no classes on Monday, October, 8, for the Thanksgiving holiday, as well as Tuesday, October 9, as teachers will be taking part in Professional Development.

Parent Teacher Interviews will be held on Thursday, November 8th. You will book these appointments online. We hope to see you there.

Wednesday, October 31 – Grade 5 students may dress up in costumes for the day. Please support our school dress code when choosing a costume. Please do not wear any costumes that others may find offensive. There will be notes home when all details for this day have been arranged. Each class will be having a small celebration in the afternoon. As the fall weather sets in, please be reminded that all students at R.I.B.M.S go outside during the lunch break. Please make sure that your child is appropriately dressed for the weather, rain or shine.

<u>Grade 6</u>

LA: In Language Arts, we have begun our year with a study of paragraph format, and the creation of our first writing piece *My Ideal Bookshelf*. With a continued focus on reading comprehension, we have also begun a more concentrated effort on word work. Our next unit will challenge students to use their skills of reading comprehension, and build on their knowledge of paragraph format, by identifying and expanding on the *Fiction Signposts* found in our reading. At home reading is critical! Students should be reading at least two hours per week outside of class time!

Math: Students have been learning about whole number and decimal place value, and we have been working with very large and very small numbers. Once this unit is completed, students will begin to look at prime and composite numbers, multiples, factors, and integers in our second unit of the year. Parents are reminded that students must have a **calculator** for Grade 6 Math, as several students are coming to class without one.

Science: In Science, we have started our Trees and Forests unit. Students are learning about the nutrient cycle and why our trees and forests are valued.

Social Studies: In Social, we have begun talking about a subject we will be picking apart all year: democracy. We have looked at the basics of democracy-- its pillars of freedom, justice, representation, and equity-- and how it works. In October, we will be looking at municipal democracy specifically and taking part in a massive group project called SocialCity.

Reminders: Walkathon fundraising has begun!

Grade 7

Language Arts - We are just wrapping up our All About You memoir writing unit by sharing some of our writing with some US pen pals. Next, we will be taking part in the Global Read Aloud with the novel *Refugee* by Alan Gratz. We will be connecting with some other classrooms in the USA, through online platforms such as Google Classroom and Flipgrid. Please email me if you have any questions.

Math 7C - September and October will have students working through Chapter 1: Fractions, Decimals & Percent. We explore divisibility rules, factors, comparing and ordering fractions, comparing and ordering decimals, classifying decimals, solving all operations involving decimals, and solving problems involving percent. Finally, there will be a significant amount of problem solving throughout all chapters. Please refer to my regular emails, 'The Berry Report,' for everything else chapter related!

Math 7A & 7B - Throughout the first two months, students will be working through the first unit in Math 7. This encompasses divisibility rules, decimal operations, solving problems involving percents, distinguishing types of decimals, and comparing and ordering fractions, decimals and whole numbers. Time spent practicing these skills will be very beneficial for students as the year progresses!

Math 7D - During September and October, students will be working on our Fractions, Decimals and Percent unit. Students are learning about divisibility rules, writing fractions and decimal numbers, comparing and ordering fractions and decimal numbers, solving problems involving percent, and adding and subtracting fractions. Please refer to Mrs. Holland's e-teacher page on the RIB website for daily information about homework and upcoming tests.

Science - Students are well into their first unit of grade 7 science – Interactions & Ecosystems. The main concepts in this unit that we focus on are: human activities that affect ecosystems, ways to monitor and observe changes in ecosystems, maintaining life-supporting environments, and energy and material flow in food chains and food webs. I anticipate this unit to be completed around the end of October.

Social Studies - The grade 7 students have just finished up Chapter 1 in the *Our Canada* textbook. This chapter looked specifically at three First Nations societies in Eastern Canada and their ways of life before the European explorers arrived. They have completed a project that depicts Canadian identity, contrasted and compared the First Nation societies and completed their first chapter test. In October we will be looking at the importance of orange shirt day and starting our journey into the exploration and colonization of Canada.

Reminders - Walk-A-Thon is Oct 5. Fundraising has begun. Money raised by the grade 7s goes toward POD activities, including our year-end field trip to the Calgary Zoo! All envelopes and pledge forms are due back by Oct 12 at the latest.

Grade 8

Language Arts (Mrs. Netzel)- We are off to a great start in LA. We are starting off the year with a unit entitled "Tell Your Story." So far, we have been working on daily grammar lessons, our class read aloud, <u>Refugee</u>, writing an Autobio Poem, setting up our writer's notebooks, gaining reading comprehension skills (through our weekly articles) and independent reading. Students are expected to have an independent reading book, their writer's notebook (which can be left in class), their binders and a writing utensils! Watch for Netzel's News emails for updates!

Math (Mrs. Berry-Furtado) - We are well underway in Math 8! Our first chapter has us reviewing fractions. This includes everything fraction related: lowest terms, equivalent fractions, adding fractions and subtracting fractions. After an extensive review, we hit the new content which involved multiplication and division of fractions. After that, we focused on problems involving multiple operations. These problems require us to solve using the order of operations (BEDMAS). This chapter will take the good part of September. In October, we will begin the second chapter involving percent, ratio and rate. Students will be required to convert decimals and fractions to percent. Students will also investigate the similarities and differences between ratios and rates. Finally, there will be a significant amount of problem solving throughout all chapters. Please refer to my regular emails, 'The Berry Report,' for everything else chapter related!


Science (Mrs. Friesen) - Our first unit is mix and flow of matter where we will investigate various properties of matter, and in particular fluids. We are looking forward to a great year filled with many labs and activities!

Social Studies (Mr. Smith/Miss Cleland) - Thoughts from Mr. Smith: We have had a busy September in social studies. The students have already learned about their Worldview. They've learned what elements make up their worldview as well as to not be judgemental of others. From there, we started our study of the Middle Ages. We are studying the Middle Ages so students get an idea of how bad society was before the Renaissance.

INTERNATIONAL HOST FAMILIES URGENTLY NEEDED

Good afternoon, Families,

Palliser Regional Schools offers an International Education Program for students from around the world to have the opportunity to come and study in Canada. This year, Palliser is/will be hosting students from Brazil, Colombia, Mexico, Chile, Spain, Germany, Japan, China, Philippines, Thailand, Korea, Nigeria, Sri Lanka, and Spain. Palliser's program has become widely recognized by international agencies. The popularity and success of our program is due in part to the incredible support the program has received from our wonderful host families. Without this continued support, our program would not exist.

Palliser will be welcoming a group of 19 students (ages 10-11) and two chaperones from Qingdao, China on October 23[,] 2018). The group will be here for one month (departing on November 23, 2018). It is our intent to place these students into R.I. Baker, Jennie Emery and Sunnyside schools. We are currently looking for host families that may be interested in hosting one or possibly two students (or a chaperone - 1 male (42) and 1 female (27) from this group for the time period specified.

These students will need host families who are willing to provide food, lodging and a supportive home life during their stay. Each host family will be paid \$750 per month to support the student's needs. One of the great benefits of being a homestay family is the opportunity to build connections with a family from another country and experience southern Alberta through the eyes of someone seeing our way of life for the first time.

Host families will need to submit a home stay application form, provide a criminal record check for all individuals residing in the home over the age of 18 and provide a tour of your visit from a homestay coordinator.
